THIS QUARTER'S MUSIC

A change of pace this quarter - All of the tunes I've put in are traditional ones which are included in Jean Schilling's book, "Old Time Fiddle Tunes for the Appalachian Dulcimer." I've taken the usual easy way out and changed them all to the key of "D", and put together mountain tablature for both Mixolydian/D-A-D, and Ionian/D-A-A, so that we can all play them together, whatever our instrument or tuning. Jean's book does it the "right" way, by using many different mountain dulcimer tunings depending on the way the fiddlers expect the tune to be played. Oh well...

Jean's book includes lot of good tunes, and lots of information on the music, the dulcimer and the heritage. It was printed in 1978, so I have a feeling the \$3.95 price on my copy may no longer be in effect, even if the book is still in print! You can write to them at Crying Creek Publishers, P.O. Of course, the best thing to do is visit the Schillings at their shop in Cosby, perhaps during the Cosby Dulcimer Festival in the Spring. It is also the "Folk Life Center of the Smokies", so it makes for a very interesting trip, and it's not too far away, just over the border!

Lynchburg Town - The book calls this one "Who's Going Down To Town", but I've heard it with this title. For a simple song, it has a nice progression of chords. The letters underlined in the lyrics are the ones sung on the notes.

Run Mountain - Notes in parentheses are played on the middle string. If the "grace notes" aren't clear to you, just ignore them and play the regular melody note. Then, when you have that down, add the grace notes as "lead-in" notes, sliding up to the melody note.

Sally Ann - No notes, just have fun!
