DULCIMER CLUB NEWS

We've got a 20th Anniversary coming up! Carl's records show dues first being paid on April 10, 1983, so unless you have an older newsletter, etc., we're going to use that date. We'd like to have some sort of concert or mini-festival to celebrate. Any ideas?

In the past we've had tapes available of the newsletter tunes, but I needed to rerecord them from scratch every couple of years. Now, we also have too many tunes to fit on one tape. At the last couple of meetings, we've talked about having multiple CD's instead, each covering two or three years. It looks like we can do it, and will have to charge about \$3 each, unless someone in the club has a CD duplicator/printer. We'll eventually have four to six CD's – I'll let you know when we've got the first ones ready. (We can't do all 1990-2001 at once, with our budget!)

Two of this quarter's songs are straight from our March meeting. Carl Cochrane had been looking for information on "Waltzing Matilda" and came across "Queensland Matilda" at the University of Queensland website. He played it at the meeting, and it was beautiful! (Tara, my daughter, is also playing it with her high school orchestra in competition—you should hear it by a strings orchestra!) Jann Nance played and sang "The Leaving of Liverpool", too, a well-known English folk tune. I don't know anything about "The Quaker's Courtship" other than it was in a folk song book, and is probably totally politically-incorrect!

There's a new dulcimer shop in the Asheville area! Tom Fellenbaum, known for his beautiful dulcimers (and as co-host of "Celtic Winds" on Sundays from 1-3pm on WNCW at 88.7 or at www.wncw.org) has opened "Acoustic Corner" at 105-F Montreat Road in Black Mountain.  "Who'll come a-waltzing Matilda with me?"



The Club meets in the upstairs gallery, across from the top of the ramp as you enter the Folk Art Center.

Handicapped Access is available: From Highway 70, go West from the Parkway just past the VA Medical Center to Riceville Road. Go to the Folk Art Center Service Entrance. A ramp leads to a second floor entrance next to where we set up.
