Monthly Tunes: The monthly tunes this quarter are from "American Folk Songs for Children" by Ruth Crawford Seeger. (Doubleday & Company, Garden City, NY, 1948.) They aren't necessarily children's songs, just folk songs the author thought children should know. The January tune is a quiet one—"Go to Sleepy" and was collected in North Carolina. It's a bit odd, with the first and second halves of unequal length, but it lends itself nicely to singing. The February tune is a faster, fun tune called "Riding in the Buggy, Miss Mary Jane" and was collected in South Carolina. (So why are we to moan for a guy with at least three girlfriends???) The March tune is another slower one called "What Did You Have for Your Supper? (Jimmy Randall, My Son)". That has to be the longest song title we've had in our newsletter!

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


