MONTHLY TUNES: For April: Carl Cochrane requested a Scottish tune to celebrate Tartan Day, April 6th. "The Haymakers" is a jig connected with a traditional Scottish dance. The tune also shows up in Irish collections, but we'll call it Scottish for Carl! For May: "The Keys of Heaven" is an old English folk song. According to one source, in other versions, "...the lady's cupidity is at last excited by some especially magnificent offer, and, on her consenting, the man refuses to have anything to do with her." For June: "The Tenderfoot" Another cowboy song. The poem is credited to D. J. O'Malley from about 100 years ago. "He wishes to go on record as saying that during all of his long experience in the Montana cattle country he never knew a cowboy could or would yodel." As usual, with each tune you can play just the melody line in either tuning or play the full chorded arrangement and we'll all sound just fine together!

Take I-40 Exit 55 to Highway 70, then left to the Parkway, or take I-240 Exit 7 and go East on Highway 70 to the Parkway. The Club meets in the upstairs gallery, across from the top of the ramp as you enter the Folk Art Center.

Handicapped Access is available: From Highway 70, go West from the Parkway just past the VA Medical Center to Riceville Road. Go to the Folk Art Center Service Entrance. A ramp leads to a second floor entrance next to where we set up.
