DULCIMER CLUB NEWS

MONTHLY TUNES: This quarter all of the tunes are ones collected by Anne and Frank Warner. They're tunes folks sung from memory, and with most of them you have to work a bit to get the timing to fit the words in some of the verses! For October: Tommy, collected from Martha Ann Midgette in Mann's Harbor in eastern North Carolina in 1941. For November: Moonshine, collected from Frank Proffitt in Beech Mountain, NC in 1938. For December: The Young Prince of Spain, collected from Lena Bourne Fish in NH in 1940. And a Christmas Song from Puerto Rico. Obviously not the original words, but I couldn't find a Spanish version or any other information about the tune or lyrics.

"LEARNING CD's": Our "Tune Learning" CD series covers all WNCDC newsletter tunes from 1990-2005 in a series of nine CD's. 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
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


