MONTHLY TUNES:

<u>July 11th</u>: *Balm in Gilead*. An African-American spiritual dating back to at least the mid-19th century. Not surprisingly, there are several variations on the lyrics. This seems like the most common version. The "fermatas" () at the end of the first and last lines indicate notes that are held out, here basically played as half-notes.

<u>August 8th</u>: *Cumberland Waltz*. A waltz from Cumberland, on the northwest coast of England. An historic county established in the 12th century, Cumberland became part of the county of Cumbria in 1974. This waltz is not the one of the same name composed by Johann Strauss for Queen Victoria's coronation.

<u>September 12th</u>: *Adieu, My Lovely Nancy*. An old English song dealing with the sea and missing those left behind at home.

MEETING LOCATION/TIME

Second Sunday of each month from 2:30-5:00 at The Folk Art Center Upstairs Gallery, Blue Ridge Parkway, Asheville

The Folk Art Center is located on the Blue Ridge Parkway at Milepost 382, about 1/2 mile North of US 70, just East of Asheville. Take I-40 Exit 55 to Highway 70, then left to the Parkway, or take I-240 Exit 7 and go East on Highway 70 to the Parkway. The Club meets in the upstairs gallery, across from the top of the ramp as you enter the Folk Art Center.

Handicapped Access is available: From Highway 70, go West from the Parkway just past the VA Medical Center to Riceville Road. Go to the Folk Art Center Service Entrance. A ramp leads to a second floor entrance next to where we set up.
