### **MONTHLY TUNES:**

April 10th: Rubber Dolly. A clapping song that has claims as a Scottish, English and Irish song, as well as having been collected in the Ozarks. Because of that, there are many variations in the lyrics and tune. I hope you like this one.

May 8th: Sow Weaving Silk. Happy Mother's Day! A nonsense song sung by mothers to their children. It was collected in 1941 as sung by Myra Pipkin, who is thought to be the inspiration for the strong mother character, "Ma Joad" in John Steinbeck's "The Grapes of Wrath".

June 12th: Twa Heids are Better than Yin. A rather humorous Scottish tale of some advice given by a mother and a wife. "Two Heads are Better than One" would the English "translation". Best known from the arrangement recorded and sung by Jimmy McGregor.



### **Rubber Dolly**

My mother told me, If I was goodie, That she would buy me A rubber dollie.

My auntie told her I kissed a soldier, Now she won't buy me A rubber dollie.

The "Rubber Dolly" title appears in a list of traditional Ozarks Mountains fiddle tunes published in 1954. According to Simon Bronner, "Rubber Dolly" was first collected as a Anglo-American children's game with words or variants which may have derived from a music-hall song of the 1890's. By the 1950's they were ensconced in British children's jump-rope play as "My Mummy Told Me." In the 1960's, Shirley Ellis included it in "The Clapping Song", which became a hit for her and several other artists. With it having gone in so many directions, there are several variations on both the lyrics and the tune, such as the one recorded by Woody Guthrie.

As sung by Myra Pipkin, recorded in 1941 at the Farm Security Administration's Arvin Federal Government Camp, also known as Weedpatch Camp, in Kern County, California. The camp was described by John Steinbeck in "The Grapes of Wrath". Mrs. Pipkin, born in Arkansas, is thought to be the inspiration for the novel's strong mother character, "Ma Joad".

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





## MEETING LOCATION/TIME

Second Sunday of each month from 2:30-5:00 at The Folk Art Center Upstairs Gallery, Blue Ridge Parkway, Asheville

The Folk Art Center is located on the Blue Ridge Parkway at Milepost 382, about 1/2 mile North of US 70, just East of Asheville. Take I-40 Exit 55 to Highway 70, then left to the Parkway, or take I-240 Exit 7 and go East on Highway 70 to the Parkway. The Club meets in the upstairs gallery, across from the top of the ramp as you enter the Folk Art Center.

Handicapped Access is available: From Highway 70, go West from the Parkway just past the VA Medical Center to Riceville Road. Go to the Folk Art Center Service Entrance. A ramp leads to a second floor entrance next to where we set up.
