#### **MONTHLY TUNES:**

April 9<sup>th</sup>: Love is a Bauble. A fun song by Richard Leveridge (1670-1758), included in the six-volume "Wit and Mirth: Or Pills to Purge Melancholy" (1720).

May 14<sup>th</sup>: *The Greenwood Tree*. A traditional Appalachian tune played beautifully by Norman and Nancy Blake on the wonderful compilation, "Song of the Hills" on Shanachie Records. It's slow and in the key of D, so you can play along!

June 11<sup>th</sup>: *Ally Croaker*. The most famous composition of Larry Grogan of County Wexford, Ireland, written in 1725. It describes the vagrancies of a disappointed suitor of Miss Alicia Croker, the sister of the High Sheriff of County Limerick. A book of many tunes and their stories published in 1780 was called, "The history of that celebrated lady Ally Croaker." It was advertised, "In which is contained more Fun than ever was sold at so small an Expence; consisting of Funny Joaks and Blunders, and intended to instruct and Delight."

1. Love is a bauble. No man is able To say it is this, or 'tis that; An idle passion Of such a fashion, 'Tis like I cannot tell what.


2. Fair in the cradle, Foul in the saddle, 'Tis always too cold or too hot; An errant liar Fed by desire It is, and yet it is not.

Then hang him, and let him go.



# MEETING LOCATION/TIME

Second Sunday of each month from 2:30-5:00 at The Folk Art Center Upstairs Gallery, Blue Ridge Parkway, Asheville

The Folk Art Center is located on the Blue Ridge Parkway at Milepost 382, about 1/2 mile North of US 70, just East of Asheville. Take I-40 Exit 55 to Highway 70, then left to the Parkway, or take I-240 Exit 7 and go East on Highway 70 to the Parkway. The Club meets in the upstairs gallery, across from the top of the ramp as you enter the Folk Art Center.

Handicapped Access is available: From Highway 70, go West from the Parkway just past the VA Medical Center to Riceville Road. Go to the Folk Art Center Service Entrance. A ramp leads to a second floor entrance next to where we set up.
